Statement from Santa Clara County Counsel James R. Williams on Comments Filed Today with the FCC Regarding the Public Safety Implications of the Net Neutrality Rollback

COUNTY OF SANTA CLARA, Calif. — Santa Clara County Counsel James R. Williams released the following statement today regarding the County's comments filed with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) regarding the public safety implications of the Net Neutrality rollback. This step follows an October 2019 decision by the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals, which agreed with Santa Clara County that the FCC violated its core mandate by failing to consider harms to public safety and ordered the FCC to squarely address the public safety implications of the repeal:

"As we have said from the beginning, in repealing the Net Neutrality rules, the Trump administration violated the law when it failed to consider how the repeal threatens public safety. The spread of COVID-19 across the United States highlights in stark terms what we have known all along: that the FCC's repeal of these rules threatens the safety of our residents and undermines our ability to provide emergency services and efficient crisis response. The repeal also dangerously permits internet service providers to prioritize profit over the kind of reliable and unfettered internet access necessary to coordinate our County's emergency response. In light of the pandemic, we once again call upon the Trump Administration to reinstate Net Neutrality rules."

"I would also note the absurdity of the FCC denying the County's request for an extension to submit these comments in the midst of the pandemic response. The FCC's assertion is that the issue has public safety implications that must be decided without further delay. The FCC lost on this issue precisely because it did not fully consider the repeal's threats to public safety, and now it is attempting to cook the books by manipulating the timing of public comments in the middle of a pandemic that local public servants—our front-line defenders—are heroically battling. They cannot be diverted from their critical operations yet are essential to a full and accurate response to the FCC's query."
