Practicing Cultural Humility: Working Effectively with Immigrants & Refugees: **Asian Americans as a Special Reference**

Matthew R. Mock, PhD, has maintained a longstanding private clinical and consulting practice in Berkeley, California. He is also a professor of graduate psychology teaching the "next generation" of diverse mental health providers. Dr. Mock has had a dedicated career, spanning decades, in addressing mental health concerns in the California Bay Area and beyond with an emphasis on community mental health, multiculturalism and diversity, ethnic families, and cultural competence in service delivery. Dr. Mock was the Director of the Family, Youth, Children's and Multicultural Services for the City of Berkeley Mental Health Division for over 20 years and went on to serve as the statewide Director for the Center of Multicultural Development with the California Institute for Mental Health. He is active on several advisory boards including the National Center for School Mental Health (UCLA & University of Maryland, Baltimore) and the JED Foundation. As a frequently invited speaker, trainer, consultant and an accomplished author, he has humbly received numerous awards and special commendations such as the Cultural and Economic Diversity Award from the and the California Statewide Cultural Competence Award from the Department of Mental Health. In 2019, Dr. Mock was presented a lifetime Distinguished Contributions Award from the national Asian American Psychological Association (AAPA).

Course Description:

Immigrants, refugees and those arriving from other countries have always been significant contributors to this nation. Individual and family histories, and stories of arrival to the U.S. impact the mental health and adjustment of immigrants, refugees, and migrant families arriving to their new home. In order to provide culturally responsive services to these diverse individuals, families and their communities, there must be special considerations given an array of issues including social adjustment, experiences of losses, acculturation and more. Trauma-informed care, significant in clinical approaches, will be presented. With May being Asian Pacific American heritage month, examples from these communities will be additionally referenced.

Course Objectives:

By the end of the workshop, attendees will be able to:

1. Describe and list (at least 2)

- Describe and list (at least 3) ways relocation and migration impact those displaced, forced to arrive, including immigrants and refugees, that can be sources of mental stress.
- Identity and list (at least 3) imperatives for working with immigrants and refugees with a focus on sources of strength and resilience that can contribute to mental health and wellness.
- Discuss ways (at least 3) of how the role of trauma has an impact on the lives of immigrants and
- List principles (at least 4) of forming effective working relationships and partnerships with immigrant, refugee and other migrant communities including the role of trauma-informed care and 'self-of-the-therapist.'
- Describe social examples (at least 3) that are manifestation of anti-immigrant sentiments or perpetuation of the "perpetual foreigner" stereotype.
- List sources of strength and resilience (at least 3) that correlate with adjustment and wellness among immigrants, refugees and new migrants, including APAs as an example.
