EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The following report is an overview of crime statistics in Santa Clara County in 2023. The included crime, population, employment, and arrest data are provided by the individual law enforcement agencies annually to the District Attorney's Office Crime Strategies Unit for analysis.

In response to Federal and State mandated reporting standards for crime data, law enforcement agencies are in various stages of transition to the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) and California Incident Based Reporting System (CIBRS). This means that law enforcement agencies will phase out use of the Summary Reporting System (SRS) of data reporting to the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program. The SRS system used a hierarchy rule to limit crime data collection for an incident to the most egregious offense only. NIBRS/CIBRS reporting differs from UCR reporting in that it allows data capture of multiple offenses for an incident, making it a more comprehensive data collection system. During the transition to NIBRS/CIBRS, crime statistics reported by law enforcement agencies may initially appear to result in increases, however, more accurately it is establishing a new baseline.

The following agencies shared data that was a combination of traditional **UCR-SRS and NIBRS/CIBRS** for the year 2023:

- Campbell Police Department (transition to NIBRS made 4/2023)
- San Jose Police Department (transition to NIBRS made 4/2023)

New to the report this year is the inclusion of data on the number of Gun Violence Restraining Orders (GVROs) issued in Santa Clara County for each calendar year from 2016 to 2023. GVROs are commonly referred to as California's "Red Flag Law" and prohibit a person who is found to pose a significant risk to themselves or others from possessing firearms and ammunition. This is a court issued order that has to be approved by a judge.

The collection of these data by the California Department of Justice began on January 1, 2016, when Assembly Bill (AB) 1014 came into effect. At the time, only immediate family members and officers could petition the court for a GVRO against persons who pose a threat to themselves or others. Through AB 61, the legislature expanded the list of individuals who could petition the court for a GVRO to include an employer, a coworker, or an employee or teacher of a secondary or postsecondary school; this bill came into effect September 1, 2020. This data is publicly sourced from the California Department of Justice Open Justice

Lastly, the report includes information on overall crimes in Santa Clara County and California, as reported to the California Department of Justice and made available through the OpenJustice Portal.

2023 REPORTED CRIME TOTALS

Previous reports provided an aggregate count of Aggravated Assault and Simple Assault into a single offense category of Assault. Under NIBRS, the definition of Assault Offenses is inclusive of: Aggravated Assault, Simple Assault, and Intimidation. For the 2023 crime data, we are continuing to report out solely on Aggravated Assault and Simple Assault but reporting the data separately.

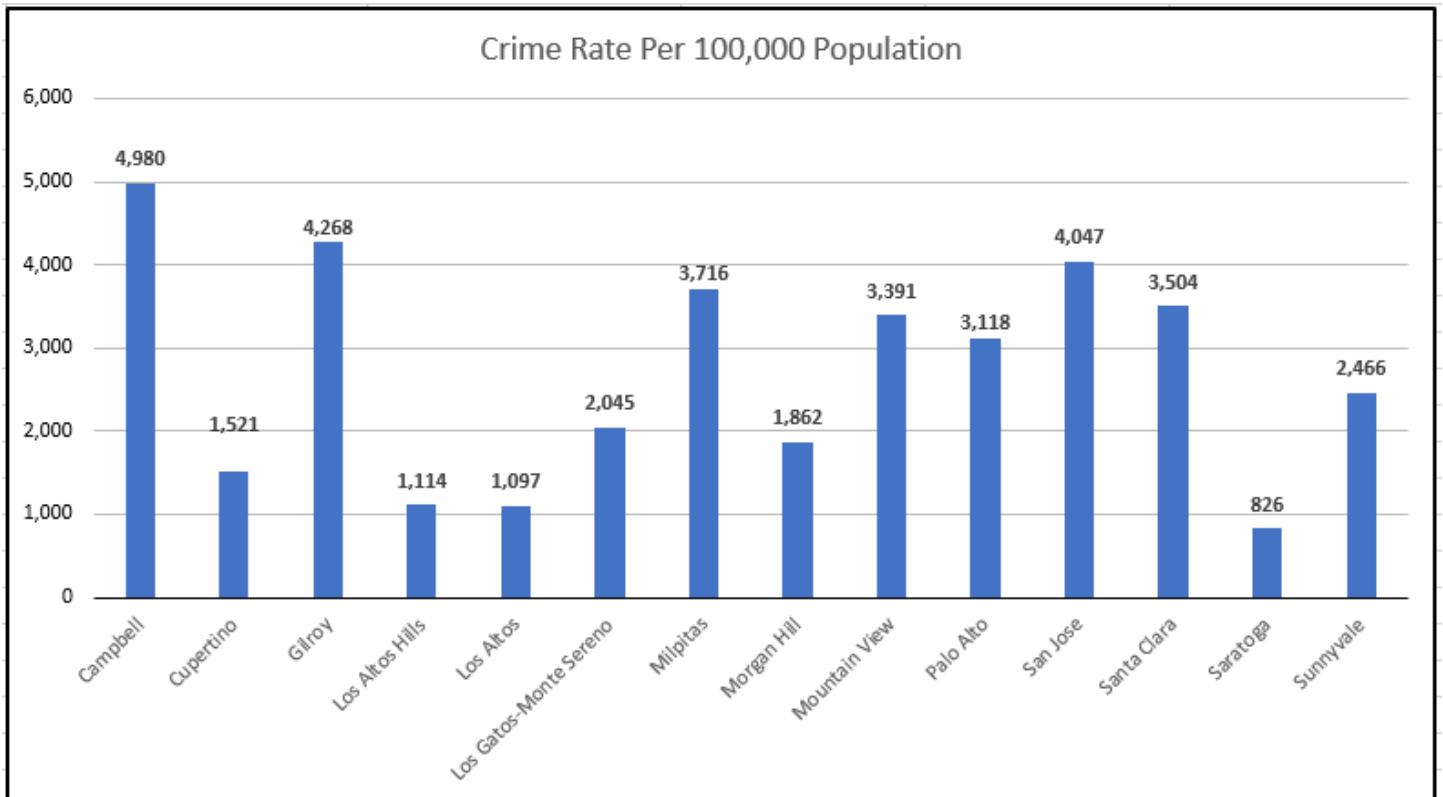

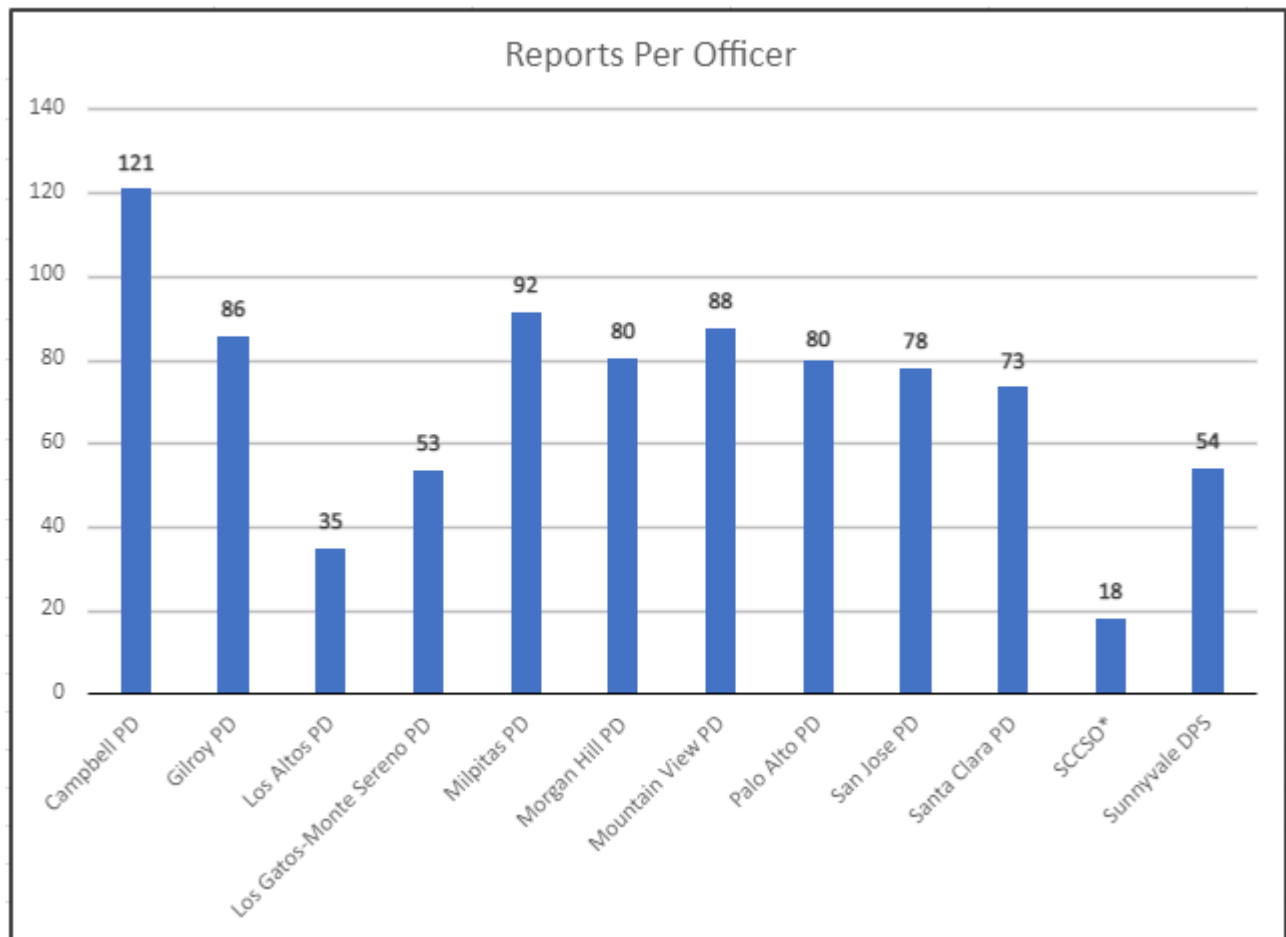

The rate is calculated by multiplying the crime totals by 100,000. That number is then divided by the population of the service jurisdiction.

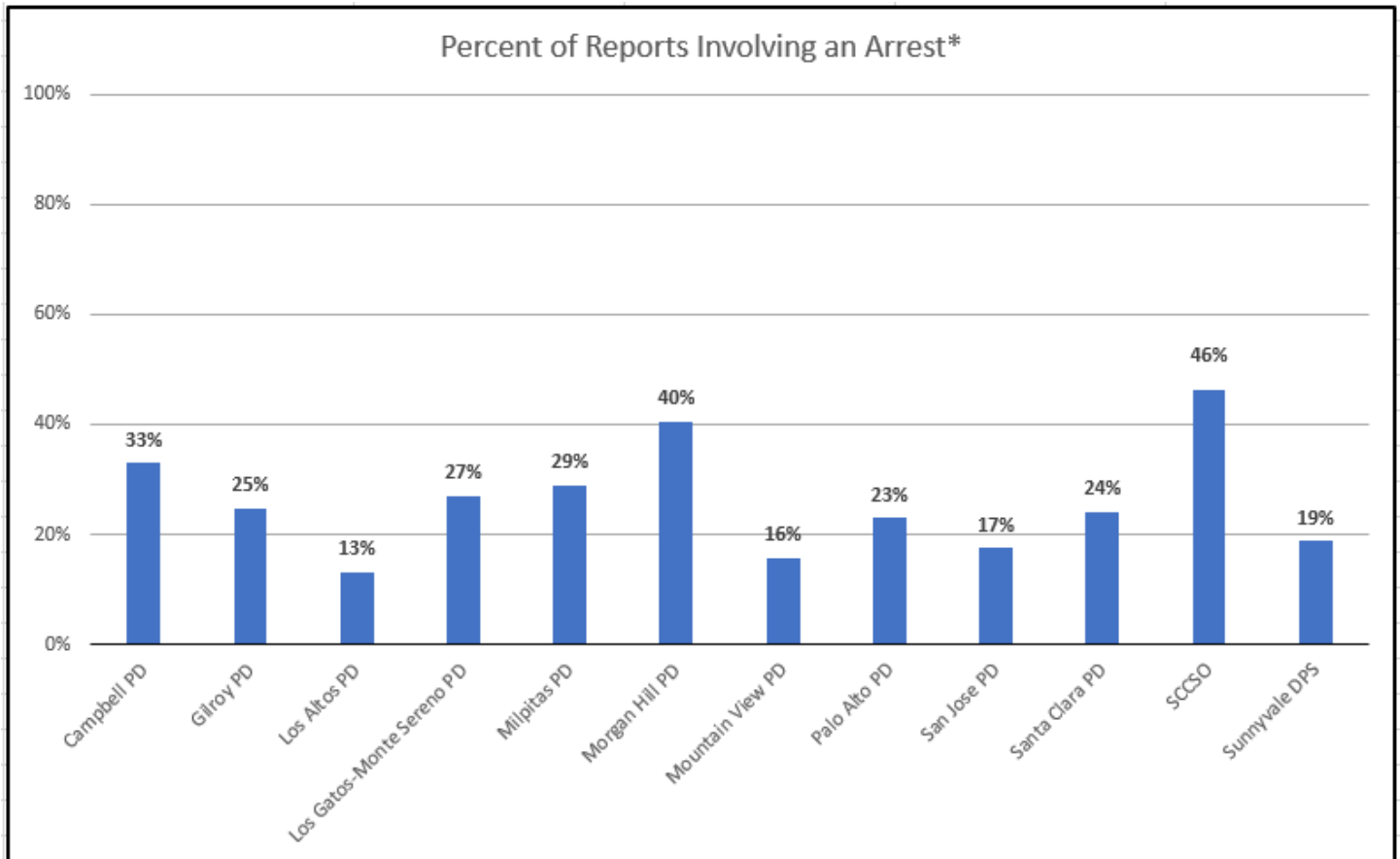

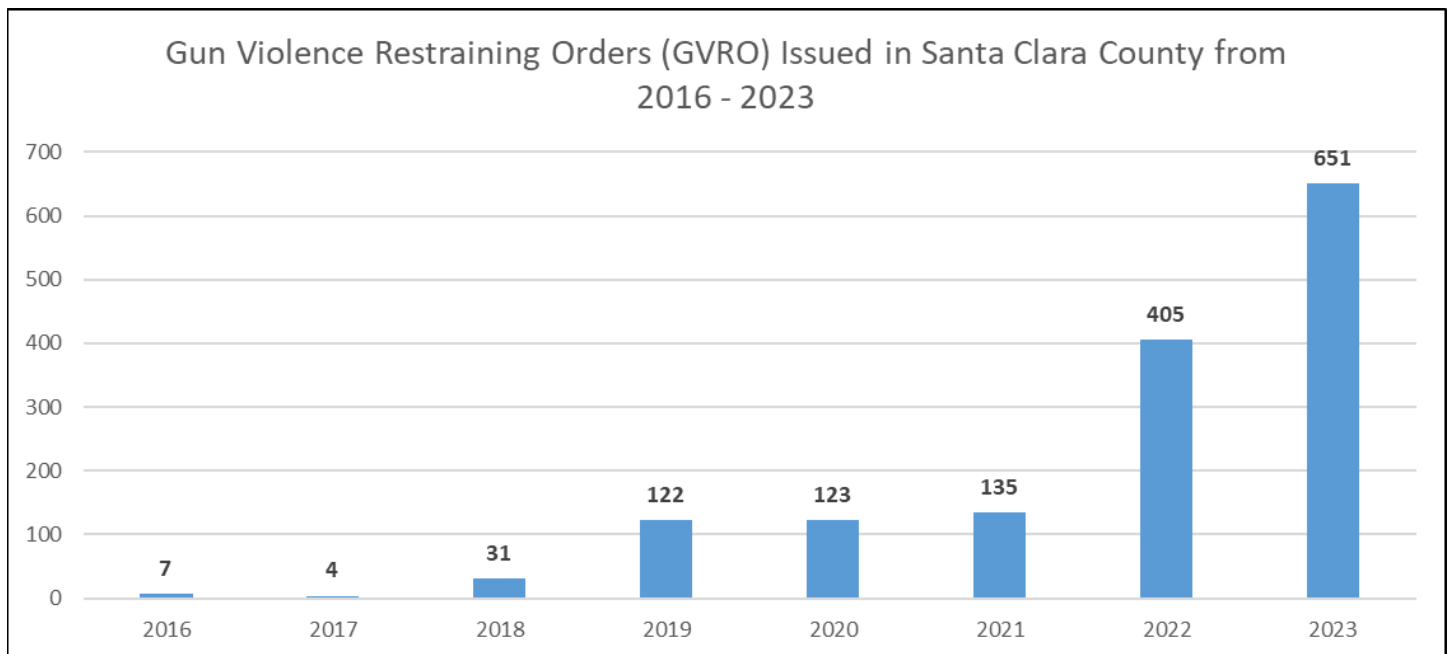

2023 GUN VIOLENCE RESTRAINING ORDER (GVRO)

The Department of Justice (DOJ) collects information on Gun Violence Restraining Orders (GVROs). Courts and law enforcement utilize the California Law Enforcement Telecommunications System (CLETS) to enter the data into the California Restraining and Protective Order System (CARPOS). The counts in the dataset reflect what is in CARPOS at the time of data extraction.

As can be seen by the data below, there was a 61% increase in the number of GVROs issued by Santa Clara County between calendar year 2022 and calendar year 2023.

SANTA CLARA COUNTY CRIME TRENDS – 2014 to 2023

The following charts display overall reported crimes in Santa Clara County and California, as reported to California's Department of Justice, and available through the OpenJustice data portal¹. This website contains data collected, mandated by the state, from all of Santa Clara County's reporting law enforcement agencies. All jurisdictions report combined "Violent Crimes", defined as a total of all reported Homicides, Rapes, Robberies and Aggravated Assaults. In addition, data is collected on "Property Crimes", which is a combined total of all reported Burglaries, Motor Vehicle Thefts and Larcenies. These crimes are further defined below. The numbers reflected in the charts are the number of reported incidents. In this context, the numbers do not reflect the number of suspects, or number of filed criminal cases. Many of the crimes may remain unsolved but were nonetheless reported to law enforcement during the reporting time frame.

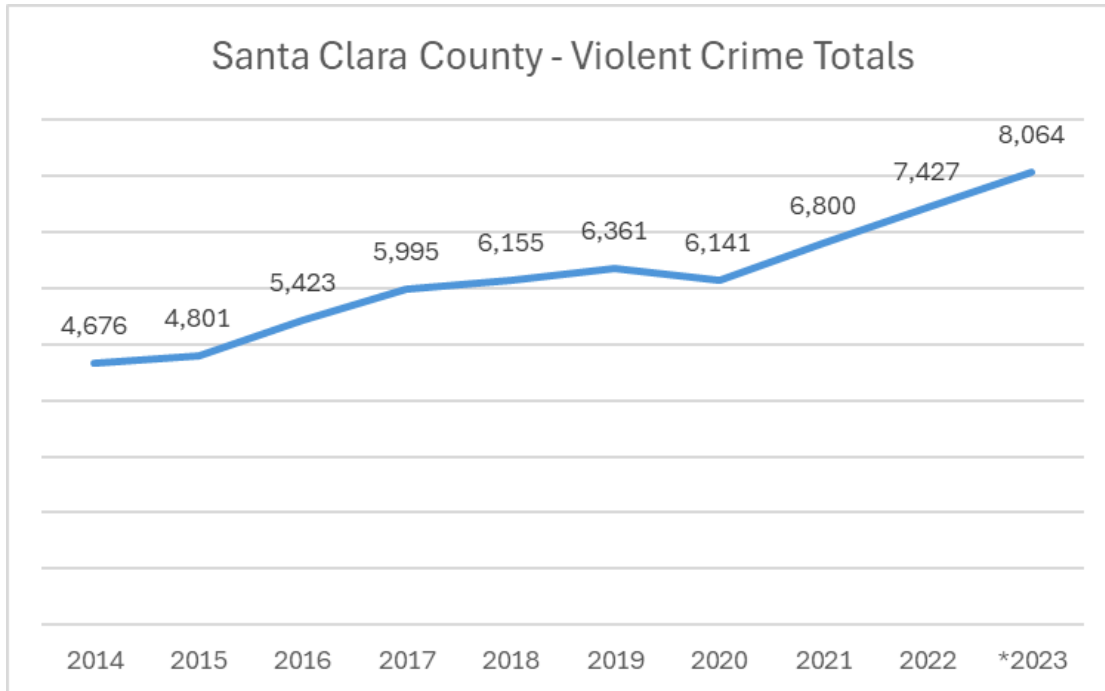
DATA LIMITATIONS

The California Department of Justice published a Readme file for each of their data sets. The Crimes and Clearances data set specifically indicated that, for 2023, the Morgan Hill Police Department did not report a full year of data and San Jose Police Department, which is the largest municipal agency in the Santa Clara County, did not report crime data for November or December. Due to this limitation, the 2023 Santa Clara County data includes totals provided to the Santa Clara County District Attorney's Office by San Jose PD data for November and December 2023. This was done to get a stronger depiction of 2023 totals for year over year comparisons. There is an exception with the Aggravated Assaults with a Firearm. An estimate was calculated based on the percentage of January – October 2023 Aggravated Assaults with a Firearm as it relates to the overall total of Aggravated Assaults. An asterisk "*" has been included on the data charts for Santa Clara County noting the discrepancy.

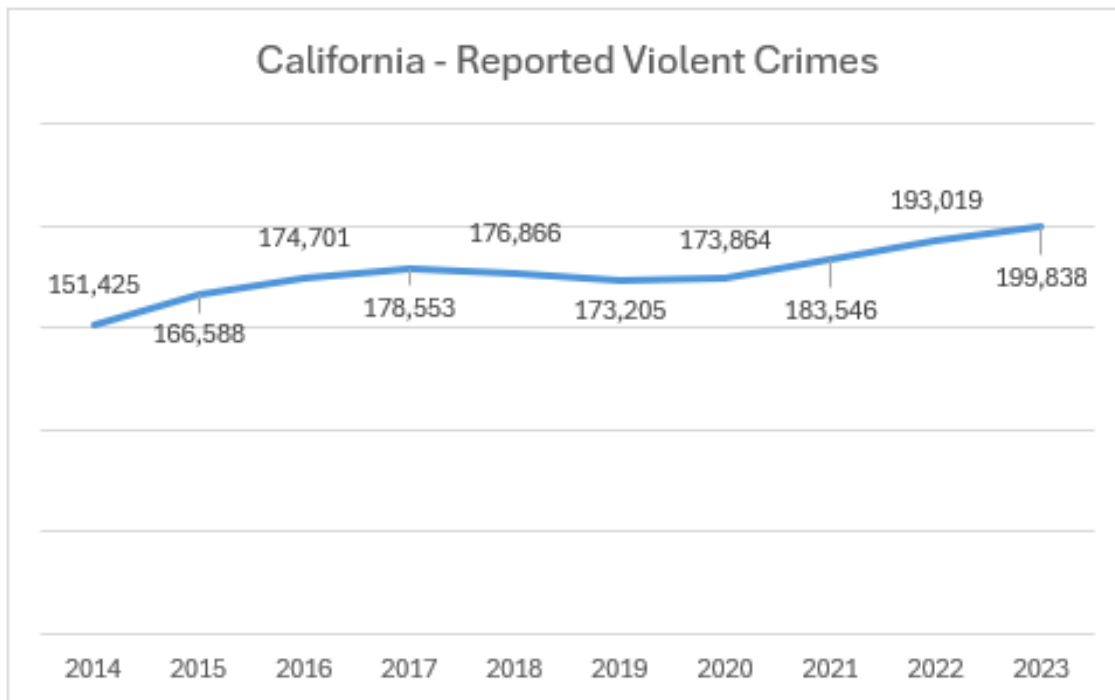

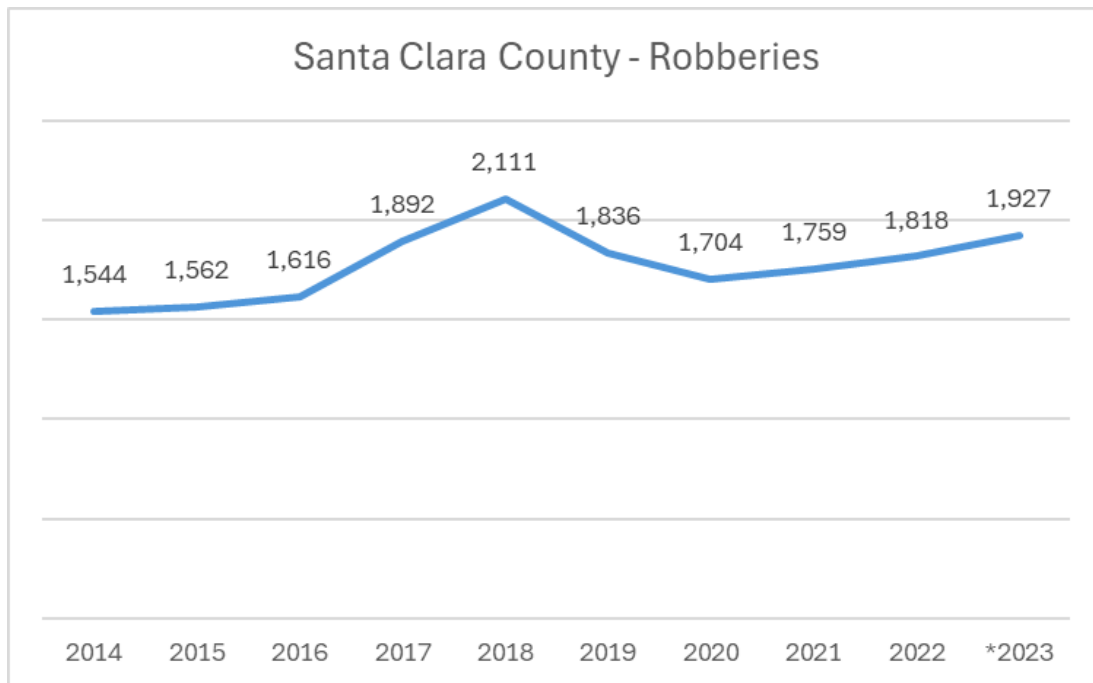

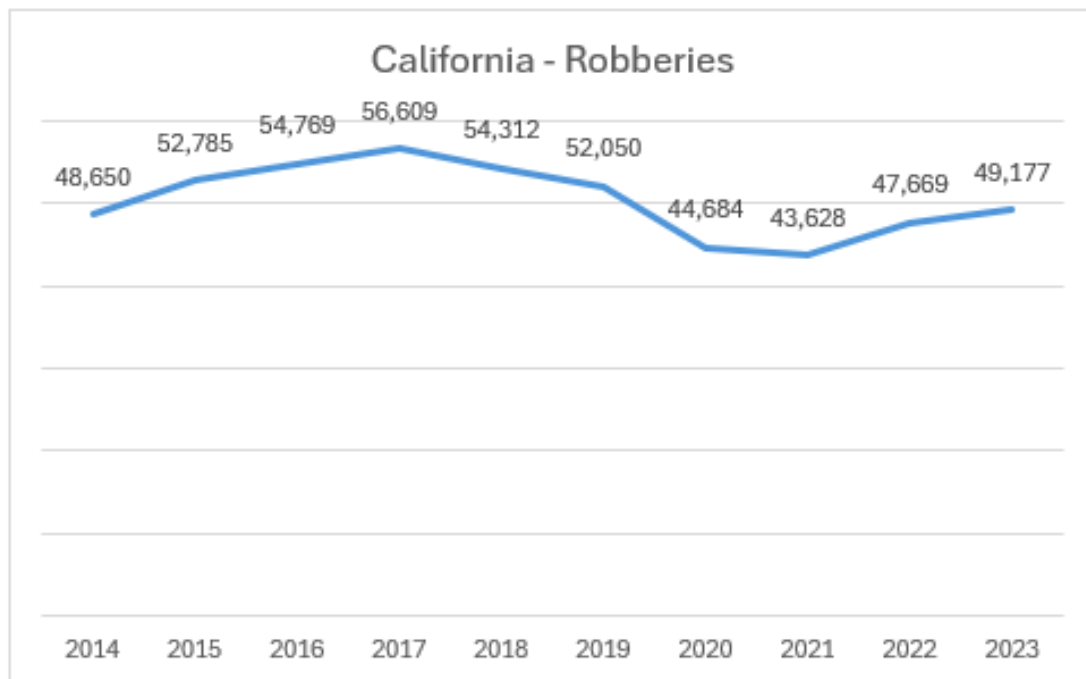

Robbery – The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.



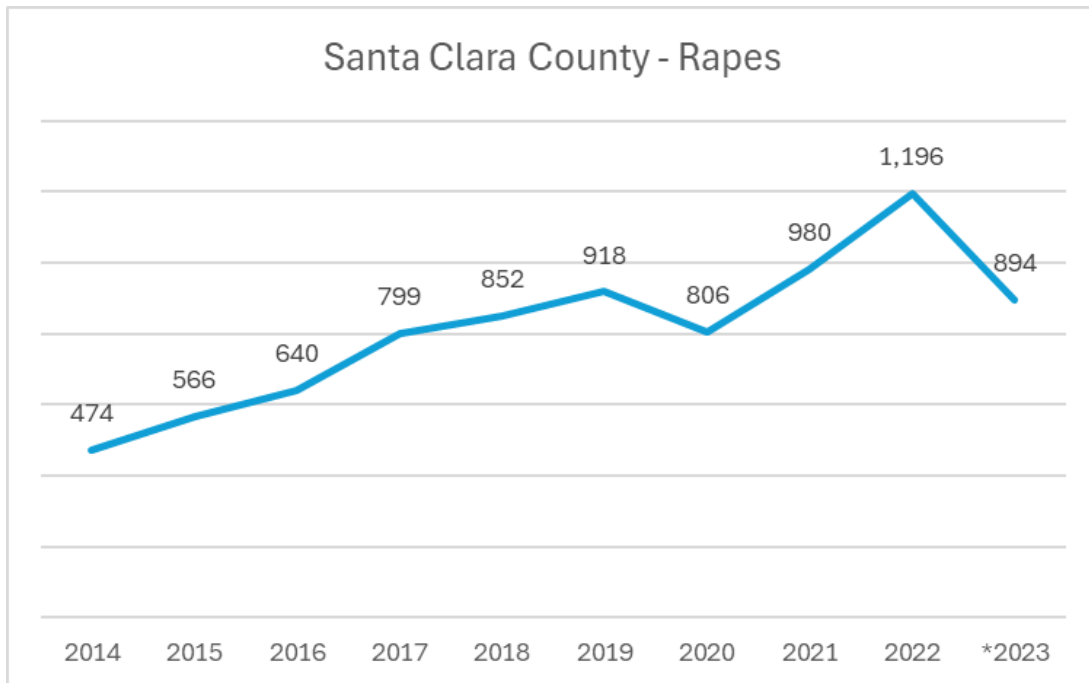

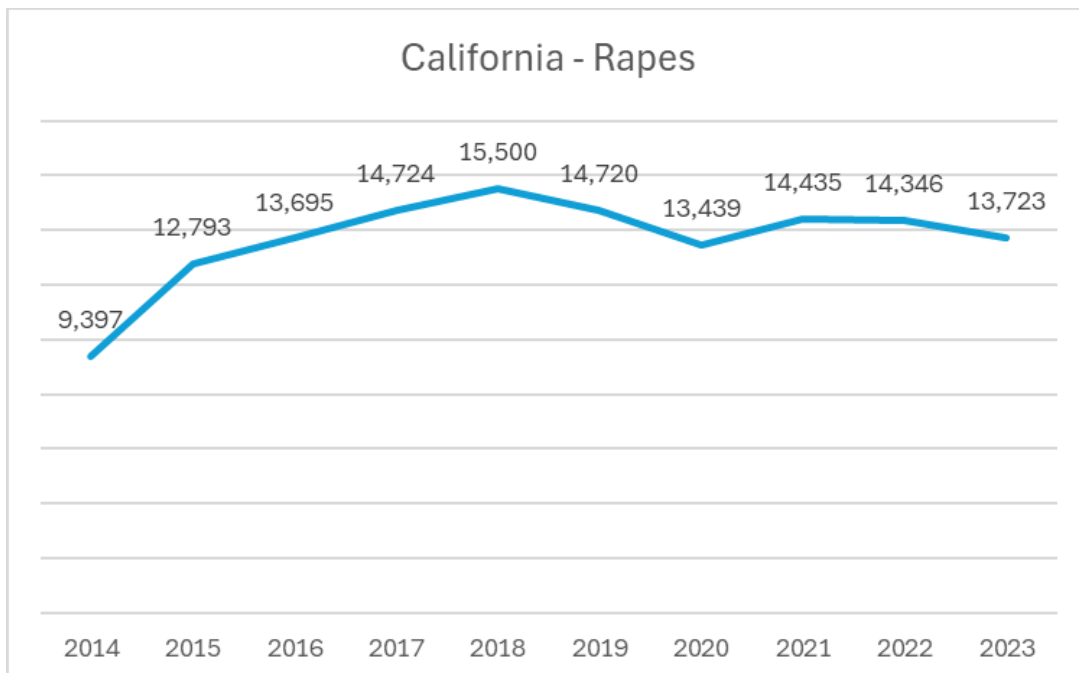

Rape - The penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim. This includes crimes against child victims.

It is important to note that the prolonged increase in reported rapes across California in the last ten years mirrors national trends. There are many factors that may play a role in this increase, including efforts to encourage reporting these traditionally unreported sexual crimes to law enforcement.

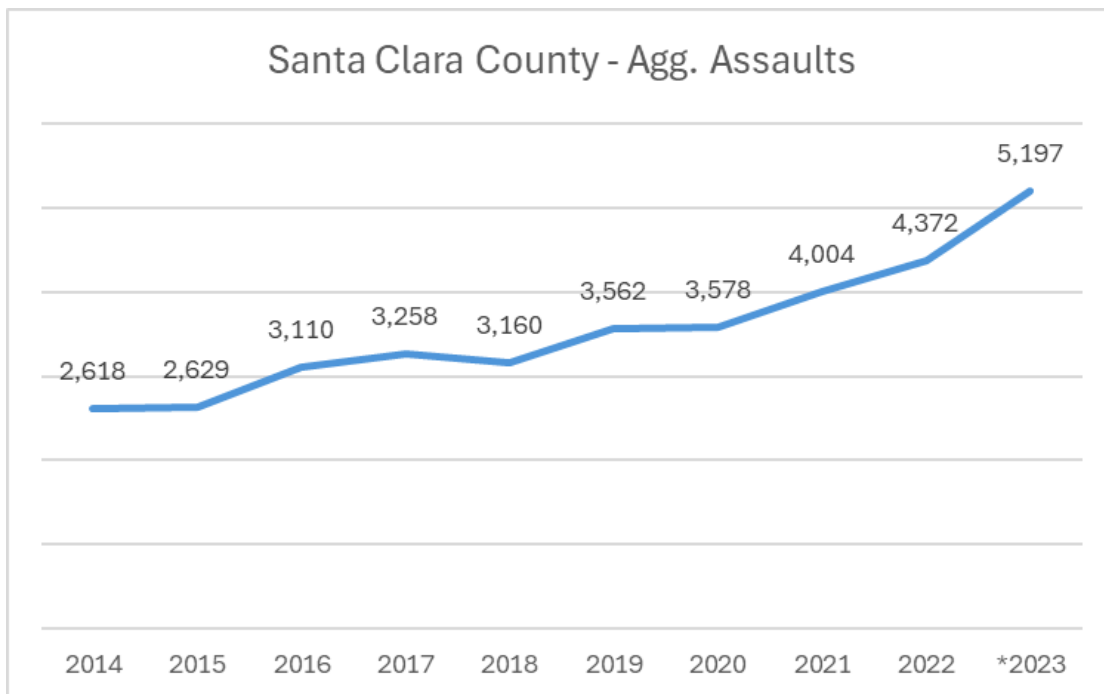

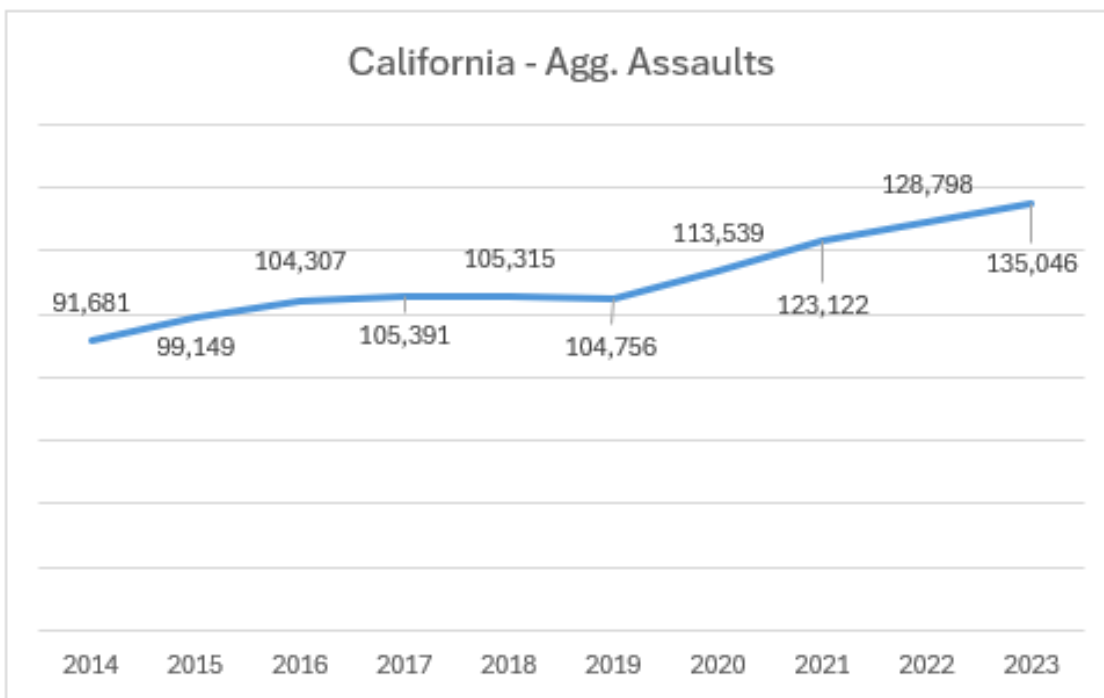


SANTA CLARA COUNTY CRIME TRENDS – 2014 to 2023

Aggravated Assault - An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. This category includes serious incidents of domestic violence, shootings, and stabbings.

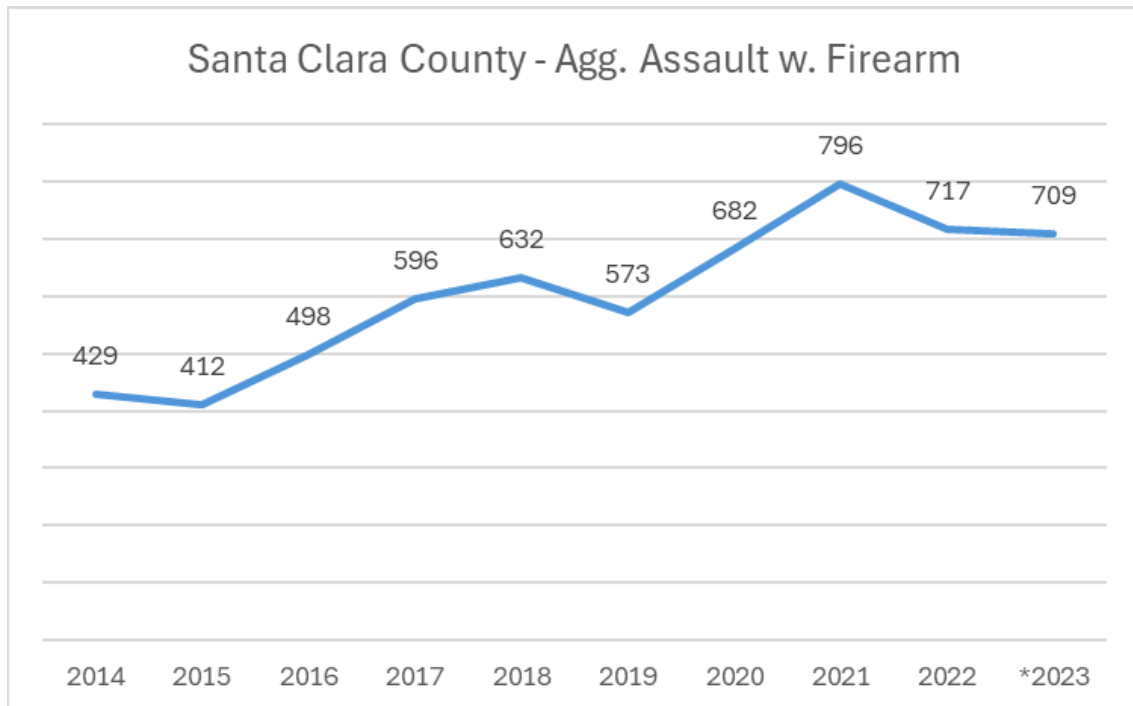

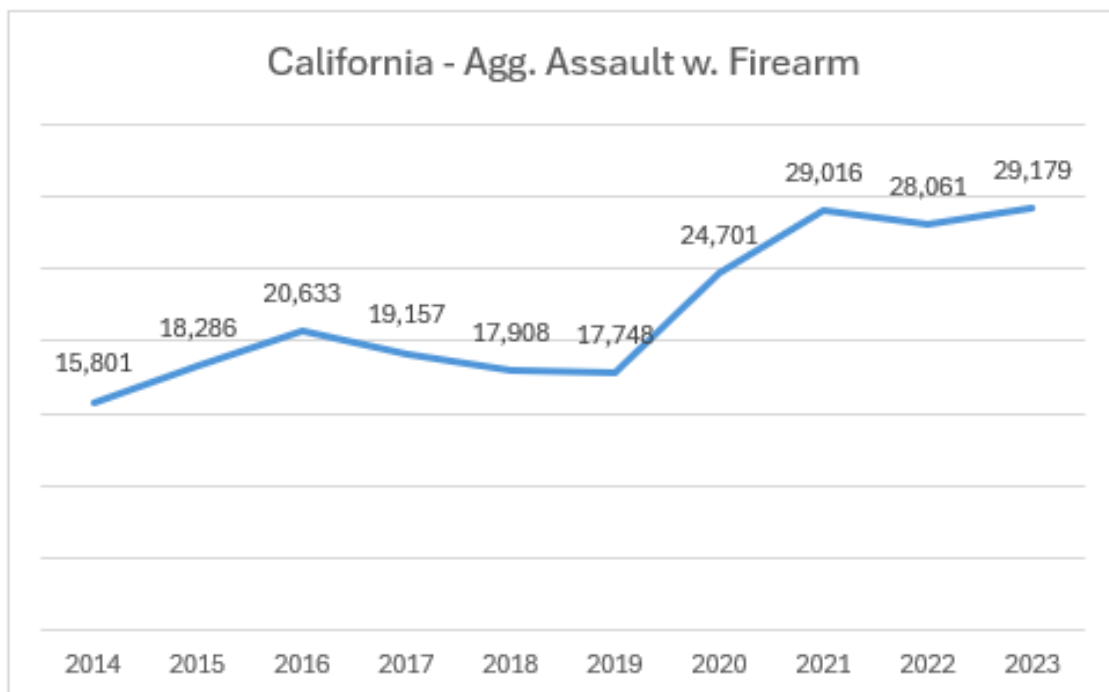

Aggravated Assault with a Firearm - this subset of aggravated assaults means that a firearm was either used to shoot at a victim or was used to assault the victim (hitting them with a firearm, pointing firearm in an assaultive way).

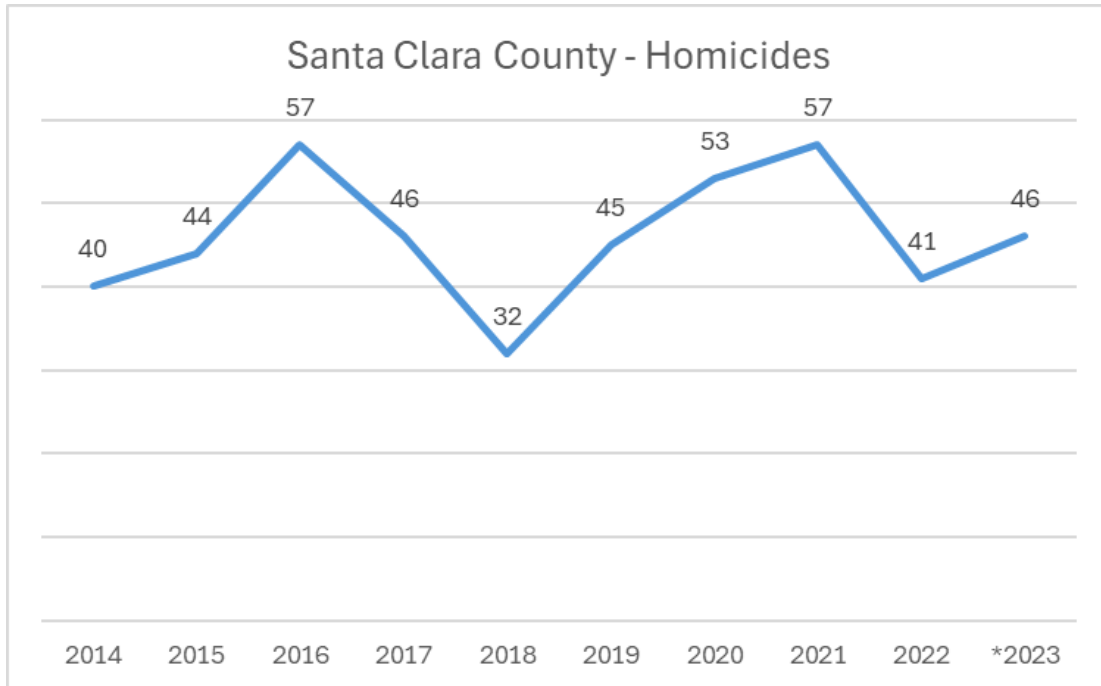

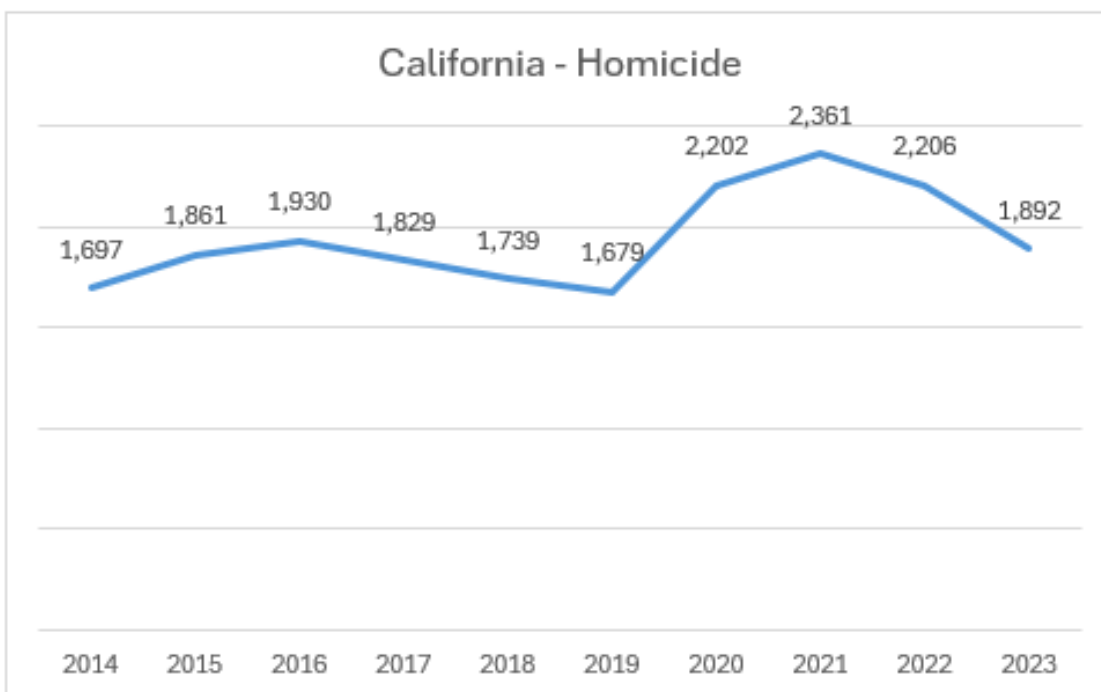

Criminal Homicide - a.) Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter: the willful (nonnegligent) killing of one human being by another. Deaths caused by negligence, attempts to kill, assaults to kill, suicides, and accidental deaths are excluded. b.) Manslaughter by negligence: the killing of another person through gross negligence. Deaths of persons due to their own negligence, accidental deaths not resulting from gross negligence, and traffic fatalities are not included in the category manslaughter by negligence.

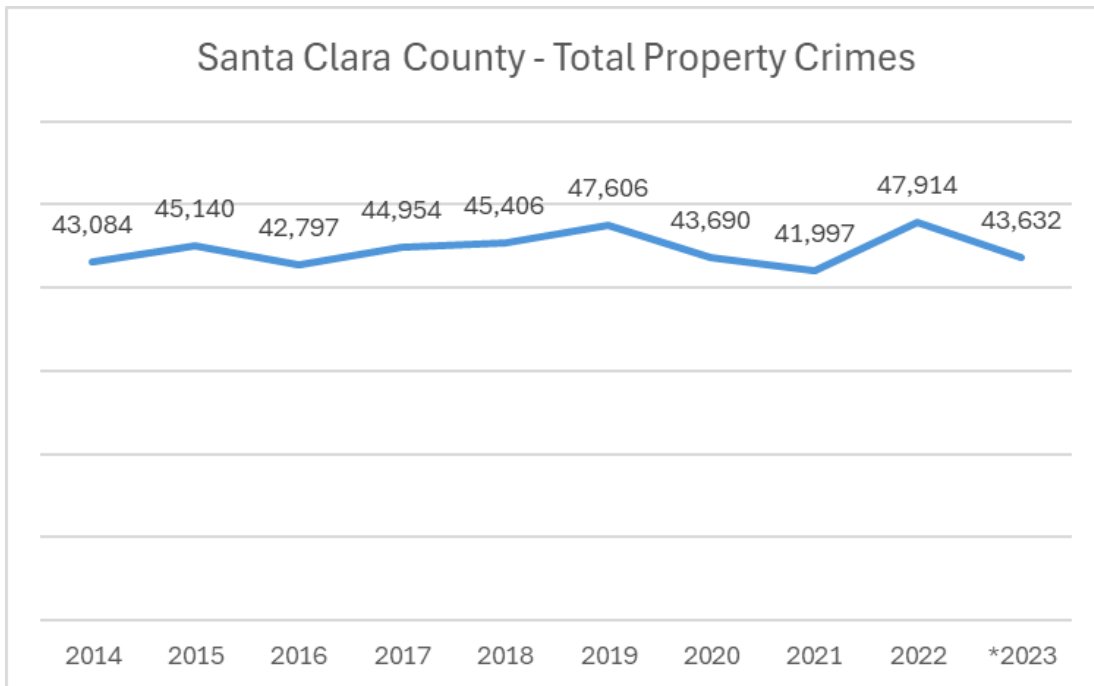

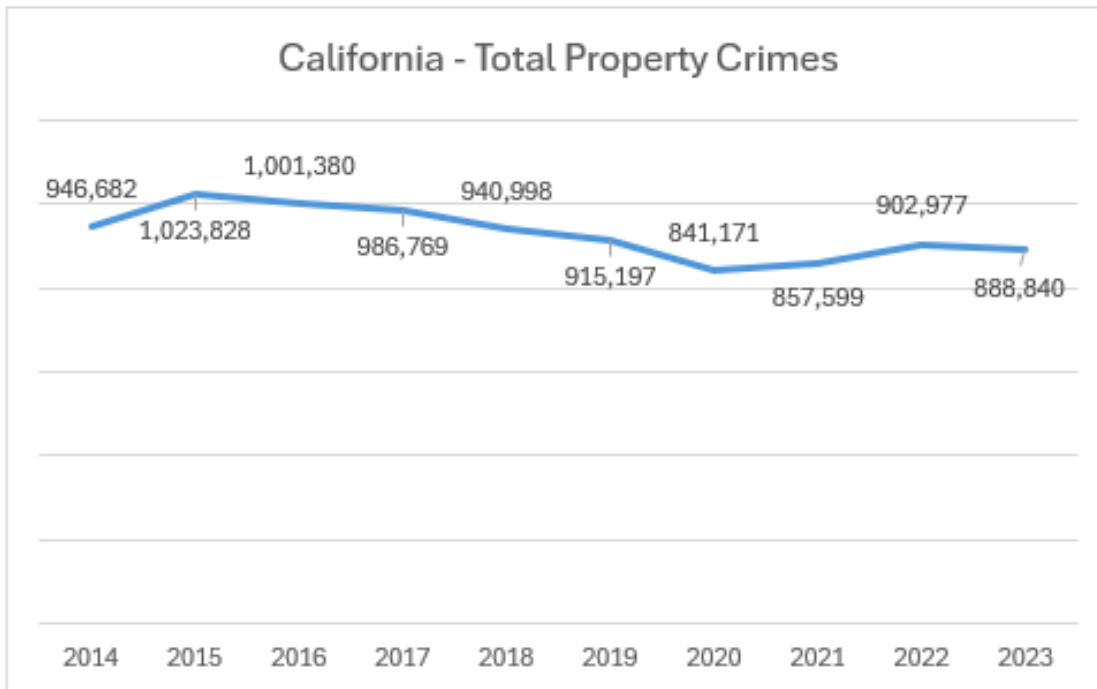

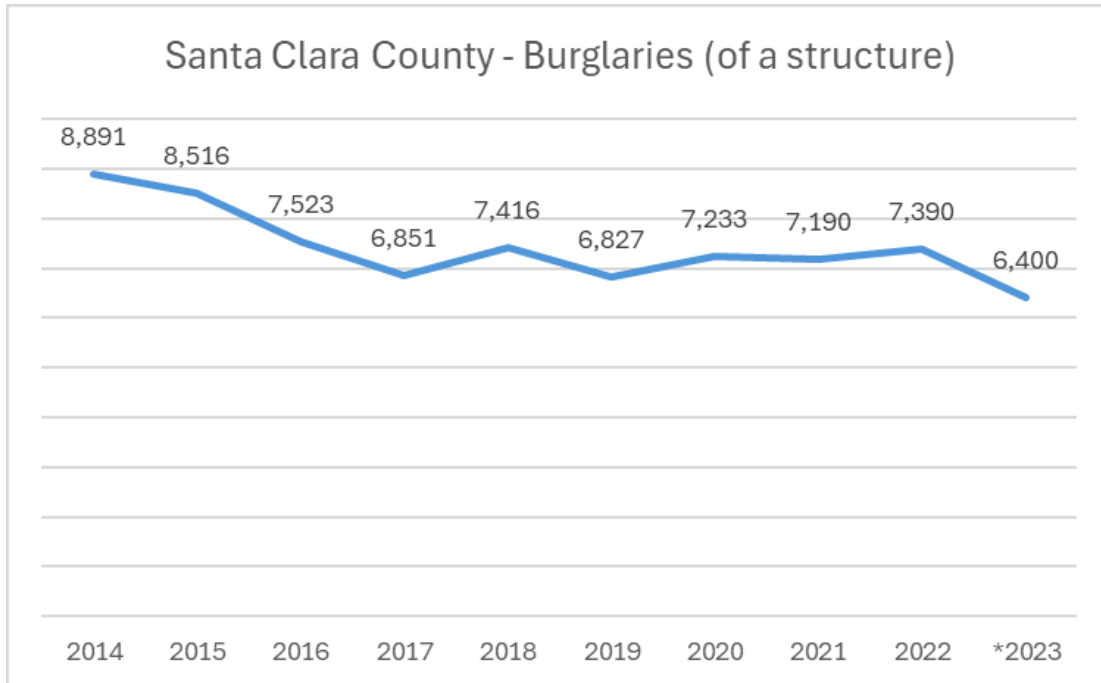

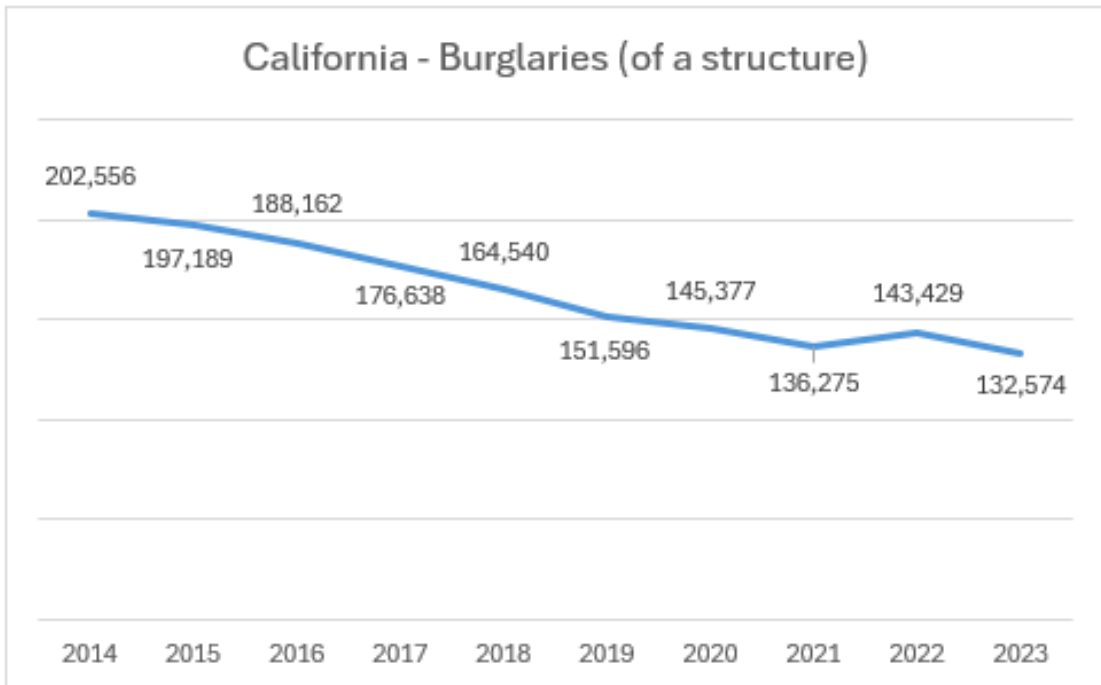

Burglary (breaking/entering) - Unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or theft. Attempted forcible entry is included. This category DOES NOT include burglary of a vehicle or shoplifting. Vehicle break ins and shoplifting are considered “larceny” for this purpose.

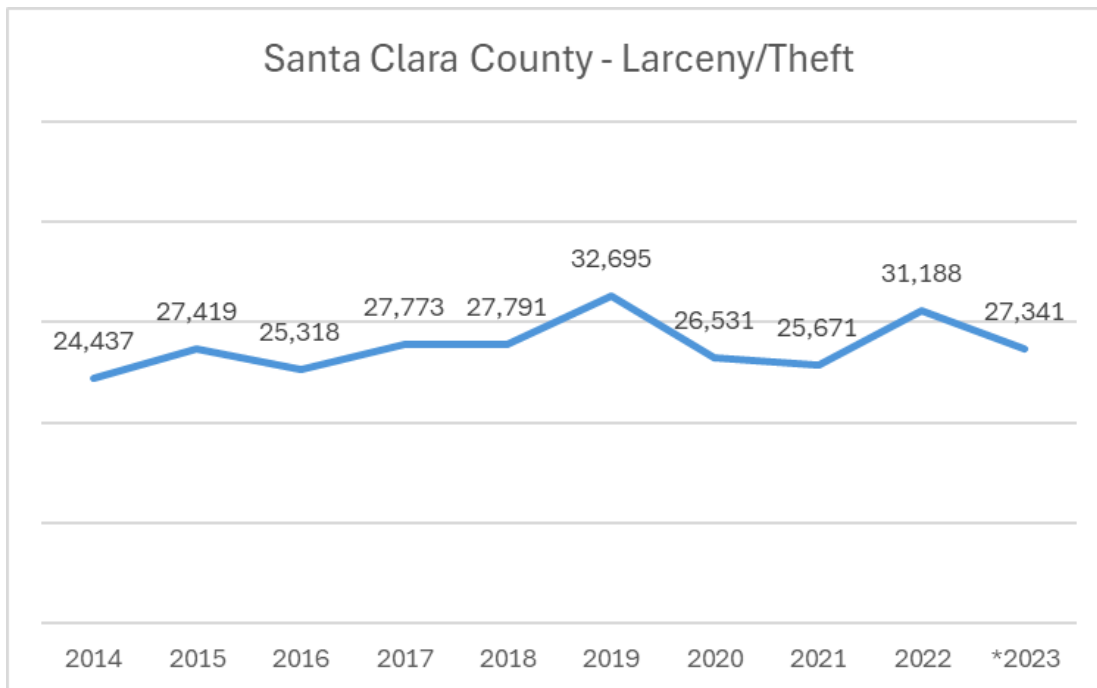

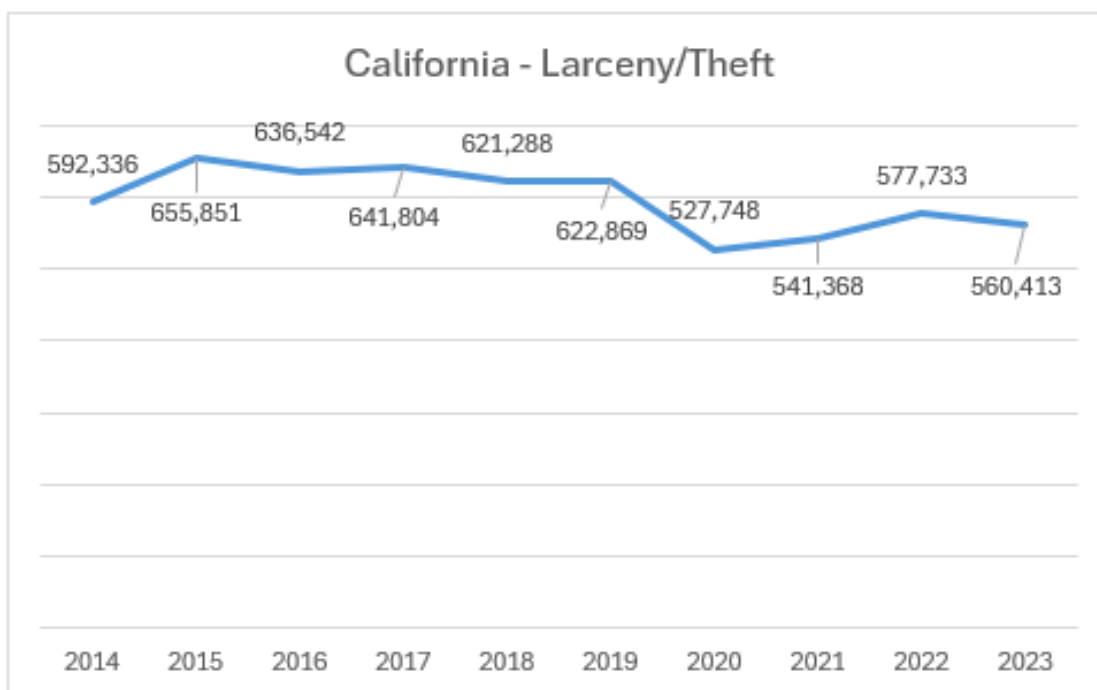


SANTA CLARA COUNTY CRIME TRENDS – 2014 to 2023

Larceny/Theft (except motor vehicle theft) - The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles, motor vehicle parts and accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article that is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, confidence games, forgery, check fraud, etc., are excluded.

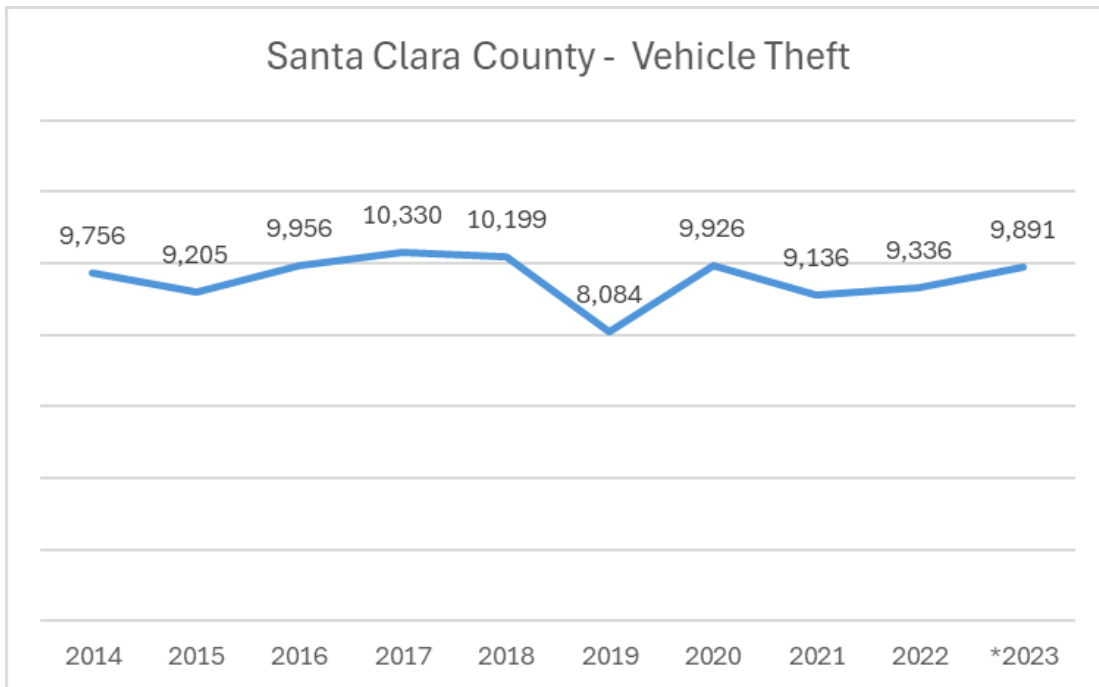

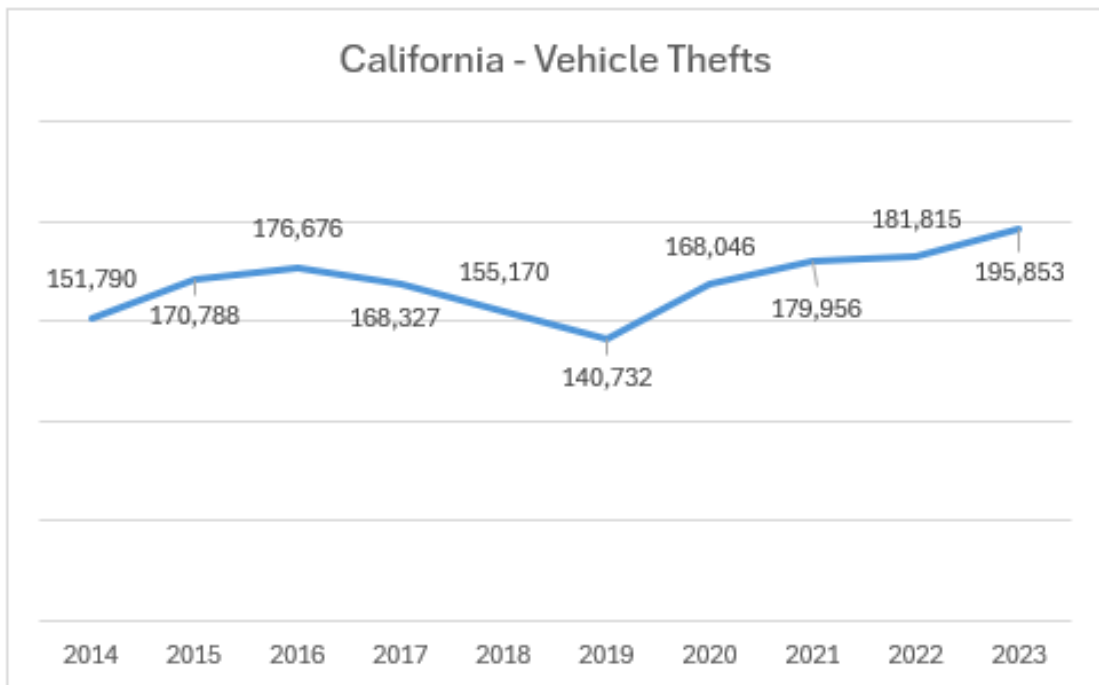

Motor Vehicle Theft - The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is self-propelled and runs on land surface and not on rails. Motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes, and farming equipment are specifically excluded from this category.

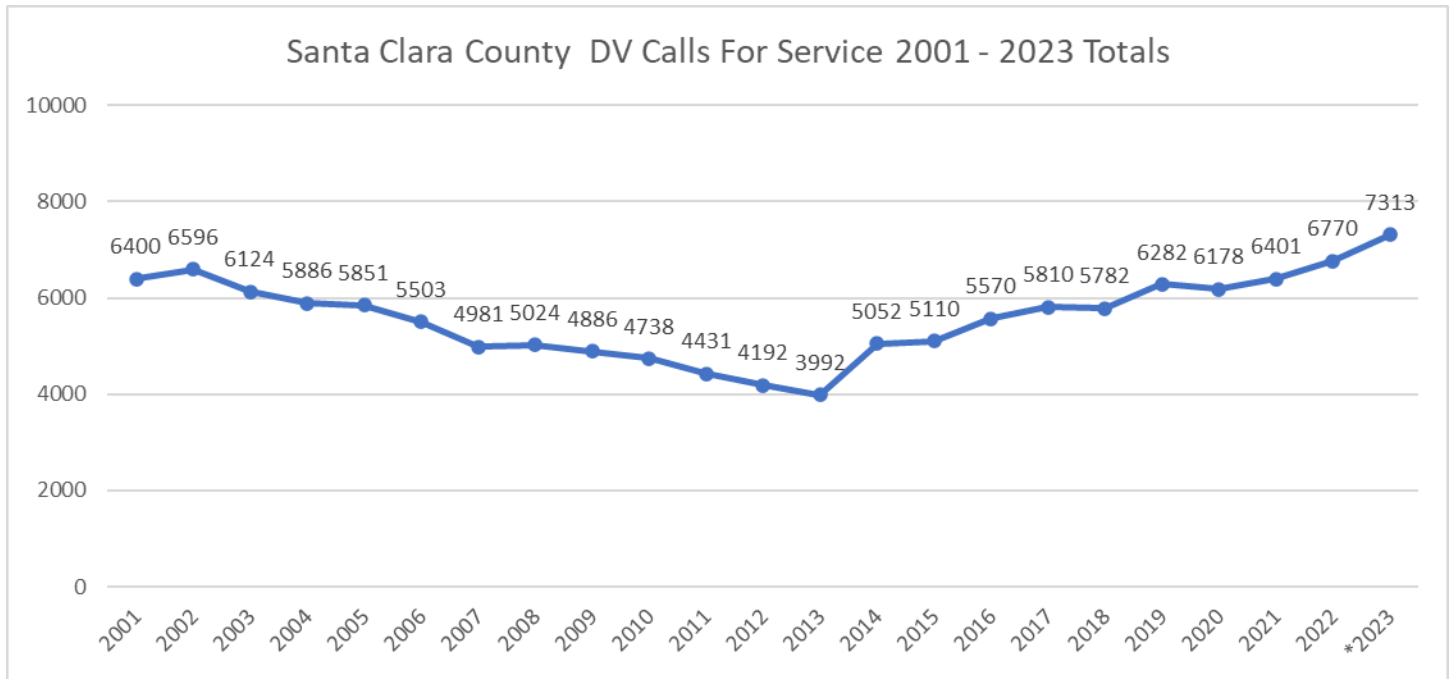
DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CALLS FOR SERVICE

California Department of Justice also tracks data regarding domestic violence “calls for service”. This term means individual calls to police agencies where the underlying offense is domestic violence. In California, overall calls have significantly declined over the last 20 years. Santa Clara County similarly experienced a decline from 2001 – 2013. An upward trend has continued from 2013 - 2023.

DATA LIMITATIONS

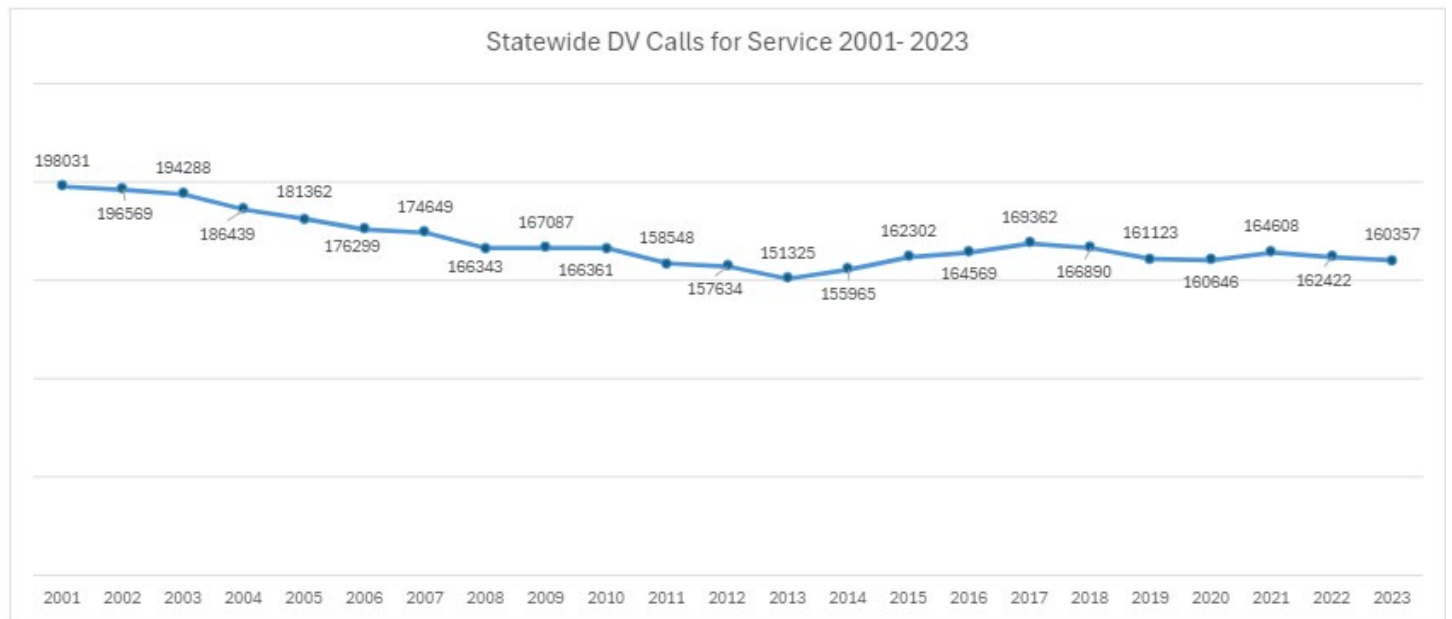
The California Department of Justice published a Readme file for each of their data sets. The Domestic Violence Related Calls for Assistance data set specifically indicated that the Morgan Hill Police Department did not report a full year of data and San Jose Police Department, which is the largest municipal agency in the Santa Clara County, did not report crime data for November or December. Due to this limitation, the 2023 Santa Clara County data for the DV Call for Service includes an estimate of San Jose PD data for November and December 2023 to get a stronger depiction of 2023 totals for year over year comparisons. An asterisk “*” has been included on the data chart for Santa Clara County noting the discrepancy.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CALLS FOR SERVICE

An average of January – October 2023 San Jose PD data available in OpenJustice was used to estimate the months with no data reported.

Statewide, domestic violence calls have significantly declined over 20 years. From 2001 to 2023 there was an 19% decrease. Since reaching the low in 2013, there has been a 6% increase in domestic violence calls (2013 to 2023).



CONCLUSION

This report shows that Santa Clara County continues to experience high levels of violent crime in comparison to data points from 10-years prior. This tends to be consistent with statewide trends. However, in 2023 Santa Clara County saw an approximate 11 percent decrease in aggravated assaults with a firearm dropping to 709 from the high point of 796 in 2021. Total property crimes have remained relatively flat the past 10-years. Worth noting is that burglary of a structure continues to a downward trend.

The Crime Strategies Unit will continue to work closely with County Law enforcement to drive down violent crime. We will continue to conduct crime trend monitoring, identify priority firearm offenders, and solve gun crimes. The Crime Strategies Unit will maintain our pursuit to bring shooters to justice and hold those persons accountable that are harming our community.
