

# Office of Reentry Services



## Who we are & what we do

We are a division of the County Executive Office responsible for the oversight of the Reentry Resource Centers in San Jose & Gilroy, and the administration and management of Santa Clara County's funds received through the Public Safety and Realignment Act (AB109) of 2011.

We work with local Criminal Justice partners and service providers, both government and non-government agencies, to provide programming, services and support to individuals who are currently incarcerated or have been recently released from incarceration into Santa Clara County.



## What Reentry Services Look Like

## Reentry Resource Center

The two Reentry Resource Centers (RRCs) are a collaborative operation that utilize a multidisciplinary approach to serving people who are reentering the community after a period of incarceration.

### Eligibility:

- Justice-involved background in Santa Clara County (SCC)
- Released from custody within the last year (SCC jail or CA prison)
- Supervised (probation/parole)
- Must reside in SCC
- Those interested in record clearance only need a background/record in SCC





## Programs in Action

 Gender Responsive Opportunities for Women (GROW) Program

- Program starts before clients are released
- Clients are identified by their Rehabilitation Officers in partnership with the Custody Health and Probation Departments
- Clients are referred to treatment or connected to a service navigator
- The service navigator will coordinate to meet clients' identified needs at intake and create a stabilization plan
- Upon completion, the service navigator will provide the discharge information to the assigned probation officer and custody health staff

## Programs in Action

- Reentry clients can register to take four classes taught by San Jose City college toward a certificate in Drug & Alcohol Peer Mentorship for FREE at the Reentry Center (classes temporarily moved online)
- Clients take Introduction to Chemical Dependency & Blueprint for Success in the fall semester, and Ethics and Personal and Professional Growth and Work Study Experience in the spring semester
- In FY20, 23 clients graduated the program with a distance ceremony via Zoom

- Program for justiceinvolved individuals to earn credits toward their high school diploma for FREE
- Taught by a dedicated teacher & self-paced
